




Gwen Chessell and Judy Crow Immortalising our Heroes






Fordyce Maxwell When Trees were Green






Joyce Quin and Moira Kilkenny Angels of the North: Notable Women of the North East


Salt On Your Tongue: Women and the Sea




Tim Tate Hitler's British Traitors










Poetry Open Mic

Schools' Programme



We will also be offering the Middle Schools and Senior Schools a series of drama workshops focusing on Shakespeare's plays. Arty-Fact will be providing these for us.



All of the above events are provided free of charge, due to the generosity of our sponsors.






Venue Map

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
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
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
