
2014 sees the launch of a festival to celebrate this talent. We hope it will become the first of many future festivals with a literary theme.

'One Missed Step',




was a finalist for the People's Book Prize 2013/14 and won a Rising Star Award for Screenplay at the 2013 Canada International Film Festival.


Margaret Skea

was published by Hutchinson


(Random House, UK) in June 2014.
