Carolina Oliphant, a contemporary of Robert Burns, wrote over ninety songs, some of which enjoyed huge world-wide popularity. But she shunned publicity and her authorship was never publicly known during her lifetime. Freeland Barbour, a direct descendant of Lady Nairne's eldest sister, has written a long-overdue biography and reassessment of her life and work, much of it based on his own family's papers. Extracts will be read by Gerda Stevenson, a multi-talented presence in the Scottish arts world and beyond.

Martins the Printers is an independent family-owned book printers, which has been operating from Berwick-upon-Tweed since 1892. In the beginning, Martins was a general commercial printer with its own local newspaper *The Mercury*, produced until 1945. In the 1950s the company started to concentrate on book publishing and has remained dedicated to book printing ever since. Today Martins is one of the few remaining book printers and binders left in the UK. The event includes a tour round the working factory. *10am tours have wheelchair access

While infused with melancholy, the elegy can also be vibrant, imparting warmth, humour and hope. We'll read contemporary elegies for inspiration and follow experiments to generate our own poems.

Whether she's writing letters to her younger self, advocating for women's rights or adapting fairy tales to process an abusive relationship, Len's voice is bold, unashamedly frank and unmistakably hers. The poems in this collection, both funny and fiercely feminist, announce a formidable new talent.

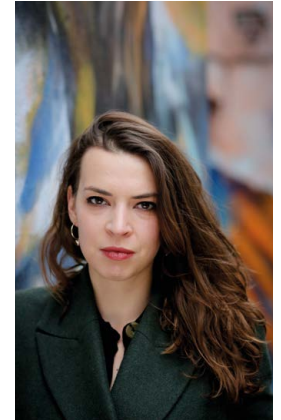
Are you drawn towards writing? Would you welcome meeting up with others following a similar path? Berwick is richly blessed with accomplished and well-known writers and poets. We know there are many others working their way towards the same goal, and yet more people thinking about it. The formation of a Berwick Writers' Forum is a simple way to make sure that support, information, opportunities to learn (and maybe even the odd social event) are available and known about. Whatever stage you are at, we are offering this event as an opportunity to discuss what would work for you. It will be what its members make it. And the Literary Festival will offer support, and an annual place in the Festival for forum members to promote an event of their choice.

The second half of the event will introduce Sabrin Hasbun, who has just completed her first book, *Wait for Her*, a memoir about the love story between her Palestinian father and Italian mother across histories and languages. Writing her family's story, Sabrin looks at her Palestinian background within a wider context of stories about displacement, transnationality, struggles for freedom and activism. *Wait for Her* won the first Footnote x Counterpoints Writing Prize and will be published in 2025.



Hold Back the Night • Jessica Moor

Novelist Jessica Moor discusses her heart wrenching new novel *Hold Back the Night*, which delves into one nurse's experience of the little-known history of conversion therapy and the heart-breaking betrayal of the AIDS crisis. Jessica studied English at Cambridge before completing a Creative Writing MA at Manchester University. She was selected as one of the *Observer's* debut novelists of 2020, and her first novel, *Keeper* was chosen by the *Sunday Times*, *Independent* and *Cosmopolitan* as one of their top debuts of the year. *Hold Back the Night* is her third novel.

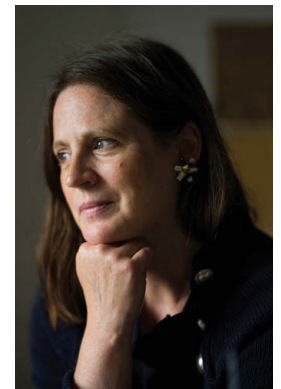
Iran • Ali Ansari

Both revolutionary and reactionary, the Islamic Republic of Iran has long been a conundrum for Western observers. In his new book, Ali Ansari takes readers on a journey through Iran's turbulent history. Beginning with the country's fall from grace as a Great Power in the nineteenth century, he explores its repeated attempts to modernize in a series of revolutionary movements and in so doing, he reveals how the experience of history and Iran's encounter with 'modernity' have come to define it. Ali Ansari is Professor of Iranian History at the University of St Andrews.



Understorey • Anna Chapman Parker

In *Understorey*, artist and writer Anna Chapman Parker records in prose and drawings a year spent looking closely at weeds, our most ubiquitous and accessible plants. What exactly are these vaguely familiar shapes that accompany our every step, yet pass beneath our notice? How and when do they emerge, bloom and subside, and what would it mean to notice them? Meditating too on how they appear in other artists' work, from a 6th century manuscript to an installation in contemporary Frankfurt, Anna explores the art of paying attention even to the smallest things.





Not That I'm Bitter • Helen Lederer

What was it like as one of a handful of women at the heart of the right-on alternative comedy scene in the 1980s? Helen Lederer was a regular on the stand-up circuit and new-wave sketch shows in the decade that launched the careers of today's comedy household names and national treasures. From the iconic *Absolutely Fabulous*, to *Bottom*, *Happy Families*, *Naked Video*, *French and Saunders*, and *Girls on Top*; it is difficult to think of a comedy show that Helen wasn't a part of. So, plain sailing then? Well, not really. *Not That I'm Bitter* is a powerful, frank, moving and characteristically funny memoir, revealing exactly how choppy the waters could be. Helen will be in conversation with Gerry Foley.

Award-winning activist, author and Ashoka Fellow Sarah P Corbett was born in Everton, the fourth most deprived ward in the UK. She was Activism Manager for Oxfam GB and founded the global Craftivist Collective to help people deliver what she coined 'Gentle Protest'. Corbett's pioneering work has helped change hearts, minds, policies and laws around the world. WWF used Corbett's 10-point manifesto to create their own successful craftivism campaign that led to a change in law protecting migrating birds. Progress and Its Discontents: A Woman's War Against Progress • Allan Cameron

The Surelikud are a minority people living near or in the Siberian Forest, and Rahväema becomes involved in the struggle to maintain this culture in the Soviet Union and post-Soviet Russia. Her career alienates her from her family and even from the people for whom she is fighting. Allan Cameron's recent book is much more than a political novel; themes include minority languages everywhere, political activism, its sacrifices, its perilous nature and its tendency in success to corrupt and undermine an activist's sense of self. Russian history (1917–2017) makes for an intriguing backdrop.

Allan, who has written a wide range of books and articles, will be in conversation with fellow novelist, James Robertson, who has written of the book, "... the readership [of] *A Woman's War against Progress* ... will find their minds stretched, challenged and enlarged by the experience. It's a remarkable achievement" (*Scottish Review*)



The Remembered Dead: Poetry, Memory and the First World War

Rupert Brooke's Sonnets of 1914, including 'If I should die ...', were the most famous poems of the First World War, offering consolation in response to countless deaths. His fellow poets pushed back with a range of challenging responses. In this talk Sally and Andrew discuss poetic representations of death in WWI and the way these bridge the divide between consolation and brutal truth.

Sally Minogue is a retired academic who is still writing. On retirement she was Principal Lecturer in English Literature at Canterbury Christ Church University. Andrew Palmer is a Principal Lecturer in modern literature at Canterbury Christ Church University. He has also published work on Virginia Woolf, Edward Thomas, Bruce Chatwin and Ray Davies. Berwick Archivist Linda Bankier will add observations on Thomas Grey, the Tweedmouth poet, and there will be an exhibition relating to Berwick in the First World War in the venue. *To mark the 110th anniversary of the outbreak of the First World War.*

Andaza: A Memoir of Food, Flavour & Freedom in the Pakistani Kitchen

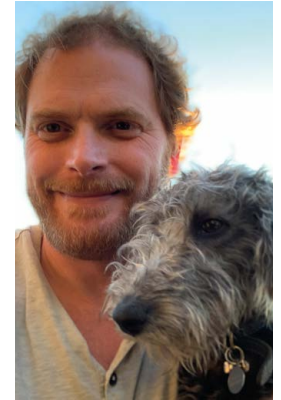
Sumayya Usmani

Bloodaxe Poetry: Niall Campbell, Sarah Holland-Batt and Katrina Porteous

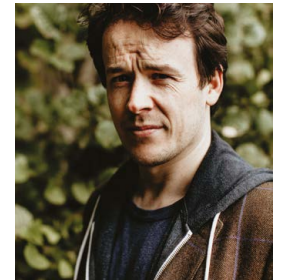

Bloodaxe Books is one of Britain's foremost poetry publishers, founded in 1978 and based in Northumberland for the past 25 years. The international range of its programme is always evident in its annual showcase of new poetry at Berwick, this year featuring poets from Australia, Scotland and Northumberland writing on islands and bridges, folk tales and fossil fish, personal loss and global extinction.

Niall Campbell was born and raised on South Uist in the Outer Hebrides, which features in his third collection, *The Island in the Sound* (2024). His debut *Moontide* (2014) won the Saltire First Book Award while *Noctuary* (2019) was shortlisted for the Forward Prize. He is Poetry Editor of *Poetry London*.

Sarah Holland-Batt is an award-winning Australian poet, editor and critic, the author of three award-winning collections. Her UK retrospective, *The Jaguar: Selected Poems*, is published by Bloodaxe in 2024. She is a Professor at Queensland University of Technology in Brisbane.

Katrina Porteous has lived on the Northumberland coast since 1987. She has published four books with Bloodaxe: *The Lost Music* (1996), *Two Countries* (2014), *Edge* (2019) and *Rhizodont* (2024). She has collaborated with both musicians and scientists, including on many radio projects on BBC Radio 3 and 4.





In Her Nature: How Women Fight for Freedom in Outdoor Sport • Rachel Hewitt

It is often claimed that women have only started participating in outdoor sport in the last 60 years, but Rachel will reveal a hidden history of female adventurers, who were scaling mountains and running across moors right from the birth of outdoor leisure. And she'll account for why these pioneering women have been forgotten. At the turn of the twentieth century, men took revenge against women's burgeoning political rights by comprehensively driving them out of sport and claiming it for men alone. Rachel will argue that we are still living in the shadow of that ostracisation.



Between Britain: Walking the History of England and Scotland • Alistair Moffat

Alistair Moffat is a life-long borderer, a prolific author and the ideal guide on this one-hundred-mile journey. We begin just north of the town of Berwick-upon-Tweed and from here we will head west as our tour travels backwards and forwards through history. In all, we will walk through eight centuries before we reach our journey's end at the mouth of the River Sark. *Between Britain* is a history book, a travelogue, a personal reminiscence and a gently prodding examination of national identity. But above all it is a celebration of a place and the people who live there.



Winter of Shadows • Clare Grant

Journey back in time to the dark side of 19th century York through the lens of the country's one and only crime scene photographer. Ada Fawkes is a photographer of the dead and in the 1860s this is a dangerous job for a woman. It arouses acrimony and accusations of witchcraft – no wonder Ada longs for a new life. But three women die in mysterious circumstances and Scotland Yard needs Ada's skills. Clare is an award-winning journalist who grew up in the Yorkshire Dales and now lives in Northumberland.

Confronting Nativist Nationalism • Ash Amin

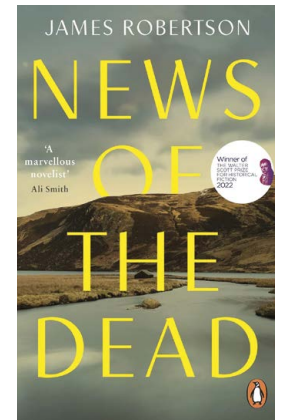
Around the world, including close at home, nationalism is on the rise, close to power, wreaking havoc on migrants, minorities, liberals, professionals, difference in general. Liberal and social democracy have been disarmed by the populist appeal of draw-bridge politics. Is there a counternarrative of belonging that could push back? Ash Amin argues for progressive interest in street-level conviviality; the public sphere as a space of genuine interaction; science, expertise and governance as arenas of participation; cause for the common and shared global challenges and art of belonging that disclose the interconnections that make the world tick.



A Writing Life • James Robertson

James Robertson is a novelist, editor, poet and publisher. He studied History at Edinburgh University and worked as a bookseller before becoming a full-time author. His novels include *Joseph Knight* (Scottish Book of the Year, 2003), *The Testament of Gideon Mack* (long-listed for the Man Booker Prize, 2006), *And the Land Lay Still* (Scottish Book of the Year, 2010), and *News of the Dead* (winner of the Walter Scott Prize for Historical Fiction, 2022). He is also a co-founder of Itchy Coo, an imprint specialising in books in the Scots language for young readers, and will also be contributing to our new schools' programme with Eyemouth High School.



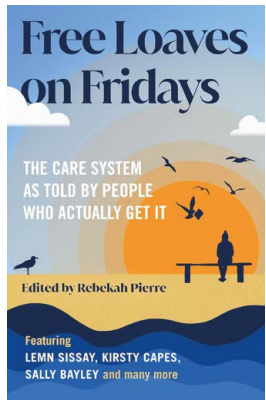
Rotary Short Story Competition

Rebekah Pierre is a care-experienced author, journalist and social worker – she has written extensively about the care system, featuring in publications such as *The Guardian*, on BBC Radio 4, in academic journals and books. Nicola Lewis is a community leader who supports young people and adults across the UK. Nicola is passionate about empowering others and opening up an honest dialogue about the diverse experiences of life in and beyond care. Sam Upton is an activist and consultant from Glasgow. Her work focuses on amplifying the care-experienced community.

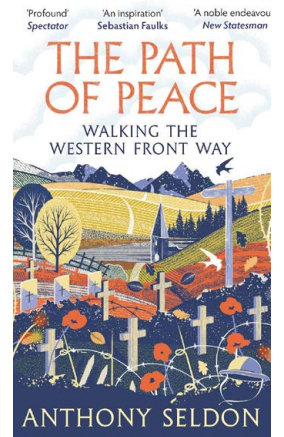

The Path of Peace • Anthony Seldon

Without a permanent home, a wife or a job, and with no clear sense of where his life was going, Anthony Seldon set out on a 35-day pilgrimage from the French-Swiss border to the English Channel. The route of his journey was inspired by a young British soldier of the First World War, Alexander Douglas Gillespie, who dreamed of creating a ‘Via Sacra’ to honour the fallen. Touching on grief, loss and the legacy of war, *The Path of Peace* is the extraordinary story of Anthony’s epic walk. Anthony is author or editor of over forty books on contemporary history, politics and education.

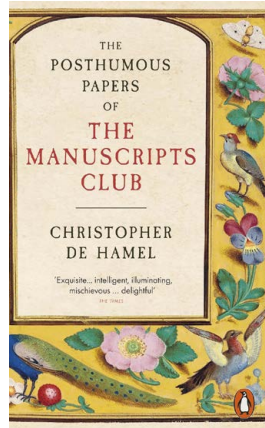
Mishal Husain always knew that the lives of her four grandparents changed forever in 1947, as the new nation states of India and Pakistan were born. But what she had was a partial story. Decades later Mishal traced how those four lives were shaped by the Raj, a world war, independence and partition.

Mishal is a broadcaster, journalist and interviewer whose work has taken her from elections and royal events to refugee camps and filming documentaries. She presents BBC Radio 4’s *Today Programme* and *Today Debates*, as well as the TV news on BBC1.

A Life among Medieval Manuscripts

Christopher de Hamel has spent his life immersed in medieval illuminated manuscripts. He ran Sotheby's illuminated manuscripts department for decades, and was appointed a fellow librarian of Corpus Christi College, Cambridge, holding many of Britain's finest examples. His books include *Meetings with Remarkable Manuscripts* and *The Posthumous Papers of the Manuscripts Club*. His copiously-illustrated talk will examine those who throughout history strived to make, hunt and possess manuscripts, to protect and share them, even to forge them ...



Lions of the Red Rose • Duke of Northumberland

Ralph Percy, 12th Duke of Northumberland began his research into his Percy ancestors as a lockdown project, which has culminated in the publication of his new book *Lions of the Red Rose*. Amid a bloody feud, four warrior brothers seek vengeance for the brutal assassination of their father during the Wars of the Roses, a blood-soaked struggle for survival between two Royal English dynasties. It is not hard to appreciate why this period in British history became the inspiration for George RR Martin's *Game of Thrones*.



Art: I know what I like and I like what I know

To mark the closure of the *Lowry and the Sea* exhibition at The Granary, Martin Newth and John Morrison will discuss definitions of 'good art'. How does the popularity of an artwork play into the ideas of what we might or might not value? Martin is an artist primarily using photography, video and installation, and Head of the School of Fine Art at the Glasgow School of Art. John Morrison is an art historian, formerly Head of the School of Divinity, History and Philosophy at the University of Aberdeen and Head of the School of History and Heritage at the University of Lincoln.



The Secrets of Blythwood Square

Sara Sheridan has a fascination with uncovering forgotten stories. In 2018 she remapped Scotland according to women's history in *Where are the Women? The Fair Botanists*. Set in Edinburgh in 1822, it was Waterstones Scottish Book of the Year 2022. Her latest novel, set in Victorian Glasgow, examines the early female gaze and the nature of shame, uncovering scandal in what was, at the time, Britain's second city of Empire. Sara will take us on a whistlestop tour of unheard stories and why they are important today.



The Edge of Solitude • Katie Hale

A lone ship journeys south, heading for the furthest reaches of Antarctica. It belongs to Sky, the billionaire behind a groundbreaking project to salvage the region. On board is disgraced environmental activist Ivy Cunningham, lending her expertise in the hope that it might rescue her reputation and perhaps even mend her relationship with her son. *The Edge of Solitude* is a story of climate emergency and human fallibility, and of the clash of ambition and principle.

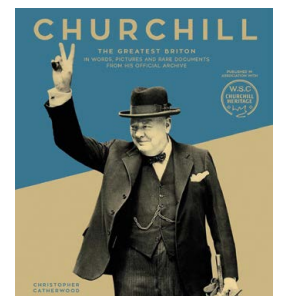

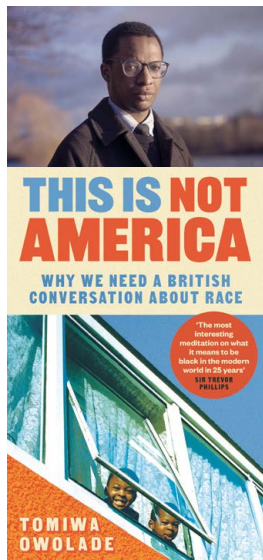

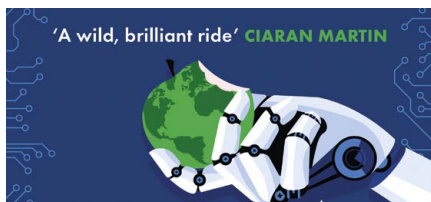


Schools' & Young People's Programme

The Accidental Time Traveller



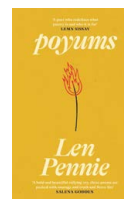

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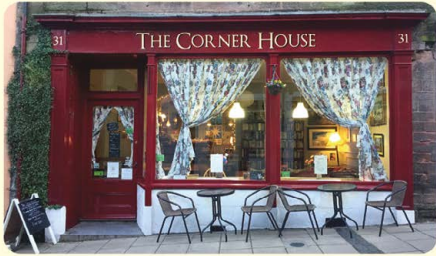
