In 2026, Berwick Literary Festival gathers around the theme
How We Find Our Way.

For two hundred years, the lighthouse at the mouth of the Tweed has offered steady guidance through changing tides. As it reaches this milestone, we take inspiration from its purpose rather than its symbolism, and turn our attention to the ways stories help us orient ourselves in the world.

How We Find Our Way is a theme about navigation rather than answers. It asks how people make sense of experience, move through uncertainty, and understand where they stand. Across fiction and non-fiction, poetry and song, history, science, art, drama and performance, this year's programme brings together writers and artists whose work sheds light on how meaning is formed, challenged and shared.

This Festival invites voices from many disciplines and traditions to explore how insight is gained, how understanding grows, and how stories help us see more clearly, both as individuals and as communities.

And you, our audience, whether you travel ten minutes or ten hours, bring curiosity and care to every conversation.

The second in a quartet of exquisitely haunting ghost stories, *Saltwater* is set on the Isle of Stroma in 1896. Sent to oversee the completion of a new lighthouse, Tom, a man of sense and science, is unprepared for the conditions on the island and soon learns there are some problems that science cannot answer, and some threats so ancient and strange, that nothing can keep them at bay. Elaine Thomson is a Scottish author who has written several historical novels under the name E. S. Thomson.

But now a new book, *The Clandestine Lives of Colonel David Smiley: Code Name 'Grin'* by Durham University academic, Clive Jones, reveals the remarkable career of a real 'Smiley,' whose exploits on behalf of British intelligence were in marked contrast to the more sedate actions of his fictional namesake.

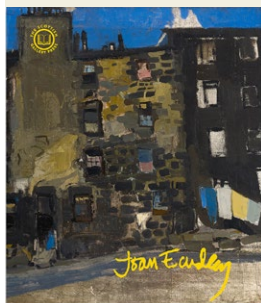

Drawing on The Scottish Gallery's long association with Joan Eardley, Christina Jansen offers an insider's view of the artist's work in Townhead and Catterline. Through the paintings and drawings Eardley exhibited at the Gallery, archive material and the public and private collections that acquired her work, the talk will explore what happened during her lifetime and how audiences responded to her work. It will also reveal some of the stories behind the exhibitions, sales and relationships that helped establish Eardley's reputation, offering a more personal perspective on one of Scotland's most important twentieth-century artists.

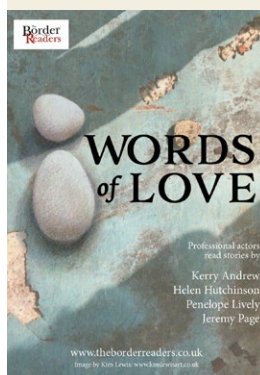
Words of Love • Border Readers

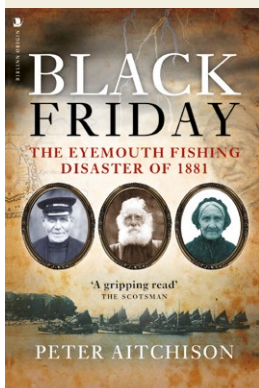


Discovering Isabella’s Berwick: A “thievish and ill-behaved” place • Amanda Roberts

Lady of the Quay, the first in a new series of historical mysteries featuring Isabella Gillhespy, takes the reader back to Berwick-upon-Tweed in Tudor times. In early 1560, Elizabeth I had been Queen for just over one year. It was a time of great change; of political, religious and social upheaval, as well as exploration. Amanda will discuss why Berwick was at the centre of political intrigue and how the town is integral to the setting of the novel, framing the challenges that Isabella has to navigate to prove her innocence.



Black Friday: The Eyemouth Fishing Disaster of 1881 • Peter Aitchison

In this compelling narrative history of the devastating storm that killed 189 men, Peter Aitchison draws upon first-hand accounts, archival research and on his own family testimony to unpack a remarkable tale of tragedy, smuggling and survival. In the context of the 200th anniversary of Berwick’s own lighthouse, this discussion will explore the precarious nature of maritime life and the resilience of coastal communities in the face of fundamental change.

Lifeboat At The End of the World

For two hundred years, the Dungeness lifeboat has launched in storms and heavy seas to frigates and barques, trawlers and dinghies. Like all lifeboat stations in the British Isles, it is led by a coxswain and staffed entirely by volunteers. Dominic Gregory volunteers as part of her crew and this is their story – remarkable yet ordinary men and women who, in their different ways, give up their time, livelihoods and safety to brave wind, tide and storms, not to mention the peril of navigating between the vast floating skyscrapers that make up so much of modern shipping.

Queer Georgians • Anthony Delaney

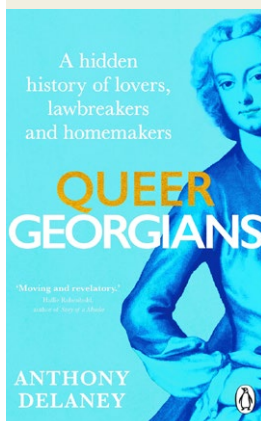

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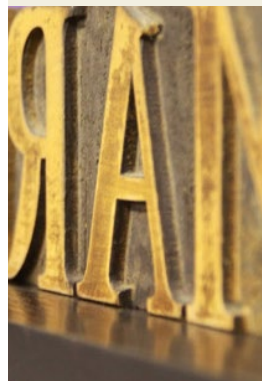
My Tics and Me, Changing the Story of

Paul Stevenson is a lived experience advocate, speaker, author of the children's book *My Tics and Me*, and played a role in the award-winning film *I Swear*. Diagnosed later in life with Tourette Syndrome, ADHD, and OCD, Paul now uses storytelling to challenge stigma and improve understanding. In this session, he will discuss the inspiration behind the book, the importance of early education, and how awareness can grow into understanding, acceptance, and inclusion for children and families.



As part of this year's Schools and Young People's Programme, Paul Stevenson

will also be visiting the high schools we work with to talk about his experiences, writing and how we can all find our way to better awareness, understanding and well-being.

Advice and further information about Tourette Syndrome (TS) can be found at Tourettes Action (www.tourettes-action.org.uk) and Tourette Scotland (www.tourettescotland.org). These organisations support people of all ages living with TS, a complex and hereditary neurological condition, affecting 1 in 100 people, and characterized by involuntary movements and vocalisations called tics. Many people with TS find the condition embarrassing, exhausting, painful and isolating.

**Killing People For a Living • Marion Todd**

This reflection is in the light of his major survey of all Christian history.

**The Lighthouse Stevensons • Bella Bathurst**

Edinburgh's Stevenson family left two astounding legacies. First were the 97 major lighthouses they constructed around the Scottish coastline between 1790 and 1940, and second was the works of Robert's grandson, Robert Louis Stevenson, who used his three-year apprenticeship as an engineer as the base material for many of his greatest tales, including *Kidnapped* and *Jekyll & Hyde*. Bella Bathurst tells the story of the family who stuck to lighthouses for so long that lighthouses stuck to them.

Only as the nights start to draw in, and the weather takes a turn, so does the house. The cosy isolation becomes menacing, and the diaries of the previous owners begin to reveal a terrible tragedy which befell Kirkhill. *Sleepers in the Snow* is an astonishing, original and powerful novel of love, loss, mystery and dementia, from bestselling author Joanne Harris.

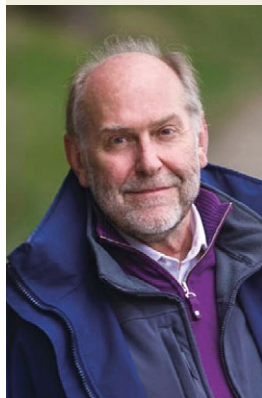

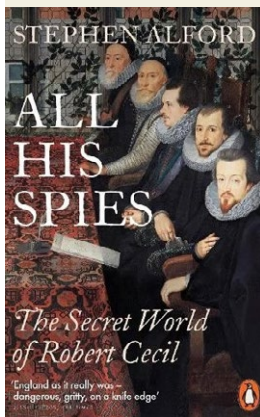

Robert Cecil, statesman and spymaster, lived through an astonishingly threatening period in English history. Queen Elizabeth had no clear successor, and enemies both external and internal threatened to destroy England as a Protestant state, most spectacularly with the Spanish Armada and the Gunpowder Plot.

All His Spies shows how easily these dramas could have turned out very differently. Cecil's sureness of purpose, his espionage network and good luck all conspired to keep England uninvaded and to create a new 'British' monarchy which has endured to the present day.



Our Brains, Ourselves • Masud Husain

Through the stories of seven of his patients, acclaimed Oxford University neurologist Masud Husain shows us how our brains create our identity, how that identity can be changed, and sometimes even be restored. 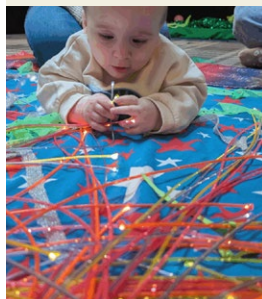
Sensory Storytelling with Adventure Babies

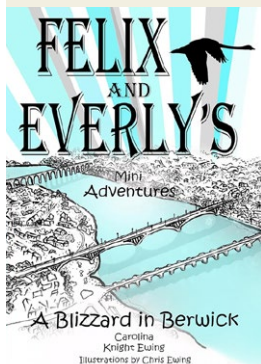

In her debut collection, *Belling the Leopard*, Clementine Ewokolo Burnley asks what remains after once-familiar places and people have gone. Her poems criss-cross the Atlantic beginning in the 1850s.

The poems of Nadine El-Enany's debut collection *Pelican Daughter* are imbued with tenderness and fuelled by a hunger for justice, connection and a more empathic world. She lectures in law and lives in London.

Roshni Gallagher is a poet from Leeds of mixed Indo-Guyanese and Irish heritage who now lives in Edinburgh. In her debut collection, *Even the Trees*, Roshni explores the porous boundary between the past and the present, and how ecological landscapes and landscapes of the mind and body are permanently altered by migration and memory.

The Literary Conversation Grows

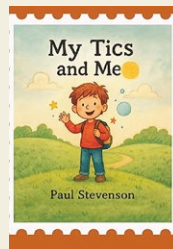
